Our programme is a mix of informal meetings, expert talks and presentations, virtual 'walks' and exhibitions.

Speaker evenings have a reputation for being informative and entertaining.

Open Evenings are devoted to talking about and researching aspects of the history of Shepherdswell and Coldred. It is rare not to learn some new and interesting facts about past life in our villages!

The society has an increasing archive of local images, photographs and documents.

We also collate oral history interviews with longer-standing residents and offer opportunities and advice about doing online research about family history.




Our meetings are free to members; £3.00 for non-members (unless otherwise stated):

Thursday 29 February: 'Thirty Years of Bother on the Hover' with Brian Laverick-Smith, former cross-channel hovercraft pilot.



The title is a rather tongue-in-cheek description of Brian's career driving the world's largest Hovercraft across the channel. Set against its history in Dover from 1968 till its demise in 2000, the talk focuses on people he met and the experiences that occurred – erring distinctly to the lighter side of life.

A humorous, fun-packed talk illustrated with slides and videos.



After his previous well-received talks on the Bayeaux Tapestry and Coldred Castle, **Paul Dalton**, an expert on the Norman Conquest, returns to Shepherdswell to talk about the Domesday Book.

This great survey of England and parts of Wales was completed by William the Conqueror in 1086.

After explaining the background and creation of the Book, Paul's talk will outline what it tells us about life in our part of East Kent


As usual, there will be exhibits and talks, food and refreshments, including an opportunity to indulge in some fantastic home-made cake.

Thursday 26 September: Kent Folksong and Singers with Geoff Doel

According to Wikipedia, there are 'relatively few traditional songs' from Kent. Tonight's talk by Geoff Doel will prove that wrong! Geoff will introduce us to a rich Kentish folk tradition — songs such as: *The Oyster Girl, The Dark Eyed Sailor, Love is Pleasing, The Whitstable May Song, The Nutting Girl, The Folkestone Murder, Hopping Down in Kent, Keys of Canterbury, All Men of Kent.* And there may well be a chance to join in a sing-a-long.



Geoff Doel lectures on literature, medieval culture and traditional culture. He has written, with his wife Fran, 16 books on aspects of traditional culture, particularly about Kent and Sussex. He has made several TV appearances including 'Time Team'.

Thursday 28 November: Special Event

The award-winning documentary film producer, Peter Williams MBE, presents his film: *A Century of Coal*, a unique history of the Kent coal field.

Peter's film outlines how miners were recruited from all over industrial Britain, to dig coal, discovered by accident in the Garden of England. They brought with them traditions of brass bands, choral singing and whippet racing. But like other migrants, they were strangers in an established community – largely one of folk who lived off the land rather than eaking out a living beneath it.

A Century of Coal is a story of love and hate, great triumphs and crushing disappointments, team spirit and laughter.



Peter Williams has produced documentaries for the BBC, ITV and Channel Four and won awards at Television Festivals across the world. A Kent Ambassador and former president of the Canterbury Festival, he was awarded his MBE in 2007 for services to the arts and television.
